PUPILS from Hackney had plenty of sports success to celebrate this month.

A 200-strong group taking part in the London Youth Games raised Hackney's overall ranking among the 33 London borough's by seven places, as well as taking home some individual medals.

Meanwhile, primary school children from across the borough strived for individual successes at the Hackney Personal Bests finals on 7 July.

Those taking part were the children who had shown the greatest level of improvement in their scores during a

training programme that has been running in a third of Hackney's primary schools this year.

PUSHING FOR POST

HE Council wants to bring Murray Grove Post Office back into use – and needs residents' help to put the the case for reopening it to Post Office Ltd.

The branch closed in June 2008, along with several other post offices in Hackney – and many more London-wide – that were victims of the Post Office

Network Change Programme.

There were strong protests last year against the closures from local residents, Mayor of Hackney Jules Pipe, councillors, local Post Office staff, and agencies

supporting vulnerable people. To back up the case for re-opening, the Council, in partnership with regeneration agency the Shoreditch Trust, is asking residents in the Hoxton area how they have been affected.

Businesses:

 The Shoreditch Trust will be carrying out a separate consultation Mayor Pipe said: "We want to know what impact the closure of Murray Grove Post Office has had on residents and businesses, and would encourage as many people as possible to let us know during the consultation.

"The Council strongly opposed the closures in the borough last summer, and sent a detailed submission to the Post Office clearly explaining how they would impact on the borough's most vulnerable residents.

"The Council has made the money available to reopen Murray Grove, now we just need to make the case to Post Office Ltd." Residents and local businesses have until the end of July to take part in a consultation, which aims to understand how they now access services such as bill payments, benefit and pension receipts, cash and financial services, as well as post services.

Support where it's needed

IT is a priority for me to make sure that the Council is always on the side of Hackney residents, never more so than during the current economic downturn. That is why we are the only Council in the country to have frozen Council Tax for four years running, meaning that Hackney's Council Tax is now lower than the London average for the first time ever, and has saved residents over £250 on average.

We are also supporting unemployed residents through our Ways Into Work programme, which has helped over 700 Hackney people find jobs, and — in the longer term — making Hackney a more attractive place to do business and create jobs by continuing to lobby for transport improvements: our work here is starting to bear fruit, with the new trains on the North London Line starting to be rolled out.

It is also important for the Council to stand up for Hackney when other organisations act against the interests of our residents. Last year I joined local residents and councillors in protesting against the decision by the Post Office to close a number of branches in the borough: unfortunately we were unsuccessful, but the Council is now looking to fill the gap left by the Post Office in the community most affected: Murray Grove, in Hoxton.

Since the Murray Grove Post Office closed, local residents – supported by councillors Philip Glanville, Clayeon McKenzie and Carole Williams – have been telling me how much they used the Post Office, and how they have been inconvenienced by its closure. The Council has put enough money aside to fund the re-opening of the Post Office, but we need to be able to demonstrate to Post Office Ltd that local residents need it to be re-opened for them to agree, which is why it is so important that as many people as possible respond to the current consultation.

UPILS were joined by Mayor of Hackney Jules Pipe when they buried a selection of weird and wonderful items in a time capsule at the site of the new Skinners' Academy.

The contents reflected the school's ethos and culture, and the pupil's aspirations for the future.

A copy of the day's newspaper was buried in the capsule, along with a DVD cataloguing the school's history, and a "talking heads" video produced by five pupils about their aspirations for the new Academy.

Sponsored by the Skinners' Company, and developed by The Learning Trust on behalf of the Council, the Academy will be a new non-denominational, sixform entry, 11-18 year old mixed school for 1,150 pupils in Woodberry Down.

The event on 14 July marked the completion of groundwork, and the start of construction. It was attended by pupils from Skinners' School and

Short film is London best

UDDING directors:
If two boys you have never met shout within earshot, "we've got a plastic bag of bones", change your script, turn your camera to the unknown duo and shout 'action'

This kind of experience became just another day at the office for Hackneybased film-maker Alex Taylor while he was shooting his experimental short Kids Might Fly, which won the 2009 Film London Best of Borough award on 6 July.

Alex's depiction of a young girl's mental health journey beat 4,000 nominations to win over a panel of industry judges, who described the film as "genre defying, unpredictable and moving".

Award-wining director Gurinder Chadha presented the award – which came with a £2,000 prize – at Bafta in central London. Alex readily admits it was a shock: "It was a great feeling and something in the way people reacted made me think it struck a chord. The ceremony was brilliant

Ridley Road Market, Hackney Central and a warehouse conversion in Hackney Wick all proudly served as a backdrop for the film, and for Alex it Picture, Film London/Elinor Jo

could not have been shot anywhere else.

"I think Hackney is an amazing place," he said.
"When I first moved here I saw a guy doing a wheelie on a moped, and a funeral marching band with a horse-drawn cart going the other way. I wouldn't live anywhere else, it'd be completely boring."

The Council's New
Pathways Film Fund, a joint
venture with Newham and
Tower Hamlets, funded
Kids Might Fly. With
additional cash from Film
London, the fund uses
some of the money raised
through filming in
Hackney to give budding
filmmakers a chance to
write, produce, and direct

their own short films.

Kids Might Fly blurs the real life experiences of young people with scripted narrative to form likeable characters.

Alex explained: "You do need some structure for films, but I wanted the absolute minimum. I'd written a full script but by the time I'd met the cast a lot of the dialogue got

thrown away as they brought so much themselves. I wanted the kids' natural energy and radiance to shine through."

He is now working on a tragi-comedy about Romanian Gypsies; entertainment wrestling; a barbershop quartet and animals in space in what he calls a "chemical reaction between cultures".

Baby look at me!

THERE were leg warmers and florescent sweatbands galore when almost 1,000 people were footloose on the streets of Shoreditch to recreate the street dance scene from Fame.

The corner of Worship Street, EC2, was transformed into the New York City avenues depicted in the iconic 1980 film, with yellow taxis, fire hydrants, pouts and poses. Police kept an eye on proceedings as a cast of professional dancers, plus actress and television presenter Denise Van Outen and comedian Johnny Vegas, were joined by hundreds of members of the public – including many Hackney residents.

The event was filmed by movie channel TCM to kick-start its Capture Your Classic competition, which runs until 28 August. Film fans are invited to submit short recreations of their favourite movie scenes.

Tranquil at mill



16-metre high windmill has appeared at a disused site in the centre of Dalston – all in the name of art.

Experimental architectural artists EXYZT have created the project, as part of the Barbican Art Gallery's major exhibition Radical Nature, and staged as part of Hackney's CREATE09 Festival. The aim was to create a peaceful place for local people during a time of great change in the lead up to the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

With around 60 rotations per minute, the windmill produces enough electricity to grind wheat to make flour and bake bread. Visitors to the site will be able to enjoy the wares of a resident baker, as well as a weekend bar and a vibrant programme of events.

These include psychoanalyst Laurence Petit gathering thoughts and opinions about Dalston; a cake decorating workshop; pedal powered music with Magnificent Revolution; and a breadmaking workshop with Somerford Grove Youth Group.

The Dalston Mill site also features a restaging of pioneering environmental artist Agnes Denes' iconic work Wheatfield – A Confrontation, 1982, where she planted and harvested two acres of wheat in Battery Park landfill in downtown New York.

The Dalston Mill project continues until 6 August and is free to attend. The entrance to Dalston Mill is located by the Peace Mural in Dalston Lane, just past Dalston Junction.

New training hub for teachers

A NEW £4.5million training hub has been unveiled by The Learning Trust.

The Tomlinson Centre – named after former chair of The Learning Trust, Sir Mike Tomlinson – will provide training courses and events for education professionals, as well as offer high-end teaching technology.

Alan Wood, Chief Executive of The Learning Trust, said: "The trust is extremely proud of Hackney's educational attainments in recent years, and we want to show our appreciation for the fantastic job our teachers are doing by providing them with world-class training resources."

Sir Mike, who recently retired, said: "I am extremely passionate about the benefits this centre will bring."

The launch also featured the results of a competition open to students throughout Hackney, which are currently on display at the centre. The winning entry was by Shannon Morgan Mee, 18. Renowned portrait painter Paul Benney, who judged the competition, praised the breadth of artistic flair in the borough at the centre's opening ceremony.

"There is clearly a wealth of artistic talent to be found in Hackney, and this is just a snapshot," he said.

CCTV snares three criminals

THE Council's CCTV cameras helped bring three criminals to iustice in one week in July.

A convicted sex offender was seen breaking the terms of his ASBO; a vandal was spotted damaging a car; and a man on the run from police for serious firearms offences was also caught. The cameras also helped recover four stolen cars — two of them belonging to Hackney residents — after CCTV operators spotted them and followed them on camera, guiding police in to catch them.

Earlier this month, the judge sentencing the killers of innocent teenager Shaquille Smith pointed to how CCTV footage had helped identify them. The Hackney CCTV Service team leader who was on duty that night identified the group as looking suspicious, and zoomed in on them, capturing vital images minutes before the fatal attack. These images were used by police to identify the attackers.

Last year, CCTV operators played a role in 773 arrests and helped recover vehicles worth over three quarters of a million pounds. In 2007/08 CCTV footage was used as evidence in over 900 cases. Cllr Alan Laing, the Council's Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods, said: "CCTV cameras are helping make the streets of Hackney safer and — equally important — they help make people feel safer, too."

Celebrating older people

HACKNEY'S 15th annual Festival for Older People continues during the coming weeks with highlights including tea dances and sports using Nintendo Wii.

On 20 July, sports and games on the Wii console will be on offer at the Community Resource Team hall, Church Walk, between 1pm and 2.30pm.

A free family event, called Glad Rags and Tea

Bags, will be held at Hackney Museum, Reading Lane, between 2pm and 4pm on 23 July.

On 30 July a free tea dance will be held at King's Hall Leisure Centre, Lower Clapton Road, between 12noon and 3pm.

On 6 August a free finale afternoon of singing, dancing and socialising takes place at King's Hall Leisure Centre between 12 noon and 3pm. Those

attending can also register for the second round of the New Age Games sport programme.

Cllr Nargis Khan, Cabinet Member for Community Services, said: "The festival forms part of our commitment to making Hackney a great place to grow old and to enabling older residents to live independent lives, free from isolation and exclusion."

Stoke Newington Town Hall

The Council is currently restoring Stoke Newington Town Hall's Assembly Room and Council Chamber to their former glory. The work is being carried out carefully to ensure the preservation of many of the original features of the building, whilst also providing flexible space for a range of uses.

The refurbished areas will provide residents, their friends and families, a great space to celebrate their life events. It will reopen in 2010, offering space for community use, such as older people's clubs, schools' activities, and private hire for parties, clubs, meetings, cultural events, citizenship and naming ceremonies. The venue will also be fully licenced to conduct marriages and civil partnerships.

If granted, the licence will take effect from 1 January 2010. The building will re-open in February 2010. Enquiries and bookings will be taken from September 2009.

The Council recognises that Stoke Newington Town Hall is located in the middle of a residential area. We will only provide permission for those events we consider to be suitable in light of this. In addition, we will be taking many steps to prevent noise, anti social behaviour and unsuitable events.

We will:

- Conduct a risk assessment for all events and ensure that any risks identified are addressed
- Implement several measures to prevent noise and disturbance to neighbouring residents, including a poise limiter.
- Put in place robust checks, which will be conducted routinely, in advance of any booking being confirmed
- Check the suitability of the content of events for their intended audiences
- Conduct appropriate checks on people supervising activities at the centre, in particular, with vulnerable people, including children

- Ensure all hirers sign a Letting Agreement, which includes conditions relating to noise and damage
- Require all hirers to leave a noise damage deposit which will be forfeited if the Letting Agreement is breached
- Restrict consumption of alcohol to certain areas of the building
- Promote public transport and the use of public car parks on Church Street in the publicity materials for the building in order to minimise impact on existing Pay & Display and permit only parking bays.

Leon, who is now 29, says his life changed for the better when he started training at as a chef at the Hoxton Apprentice five years ago.

After graduating as the restaurant's apprentice of the year in 2004, Leon, who lives just over the borough border in Manor House, served three years as commis chef at White's

in Mayfair before a short spell as chef de partie at the Commonwealth Club.

He returned to the Hoxton Apprentice last year as as chef de partie and was soon promoted to senior sous chef; he ran the kitchen for six months prior to head chef Tim Bateman being recruited.

The Queen is just one of the many celebrities he has met since then.

On the day we met he had been up since 4am to prepare a breakfast with his colleagues for a reception at

Downing Street, where he met Prime Minister Gordon Brown and former Secretary of State for Communities, Hazel Blears. He says: "Gordon Brown was different from

what I expected: I thought he would be a grumpy soand-so but he was really friendly and understood what The Hoxton Apprentice is all about. Hazel Blears was very bubbly and spoke very highly about the work we do here."

Leon was inspired to be a chef by watching his mother Heather cooking West Indian food at home and he admires celebrity chef Marco Pierre White. He says: "I like his


recipes, the way he puts things together and his calmness – he can be fiery but when he is cooking he is calm and relaxed."

And Leon aspires to have his own restaurant too. He explains: "From here I'd like to go and work in a Michelin-starred restaurant, working under extreme pressure for a couple of years. Then within about five years, I'd like to take all I've learned back where it all started -Hackney - to open a multicultural restaurant with something for everyone."

Although the mainly 'seasonal' waste generated by people in parks may look a lot, in terms of the overall amount created in the borough, it is minimal.


Unfortunately, it's not as easy as just placing bins out in parks as there are considerable financial and operational costs involved as well.

teachers in the borough are expected to be involved, before a final capoeira group is chosen to perform in Hackney and tour the country in the run-up to the London 2012 Games.

The money is part of an £8.2m fund awarded this year by the Department for International Development (DFID).

A spokesperson from Arcola explained that capoeira is one of the ways people in Brazilian slums have moved away from street violence. He said: "It's where martial arts meets dance, and has been a way to reunite people from disparate groups and different backgrounds."

Leyla Nazli, executive producer at Arcola, added: "We develop projects that combine a global perspective with strong roots in the local community.

"We want to inspire our community to see themselves as part of a global village – a

community that works together for positive change."

The Arcola combines theatre with environmental sustainability. It currently uses a hydrogen powered fuel cell for lighting that uses around a fifth of the usual power consumption for stage lights.

Eyes peeled at East Reservoir

A NEW bird hide — built on stilts to overlook the wildlife found in the East Reservoir, N16 — is proving popular with bird watchers of all ages.

Eager ornithologists now have a better view of the Stoke Newington reservoir - known for its

popularity with water birds due to its surrounding reed bed and of the London skyline.

The semi-camouflaged hide also doubles as a children's adventure play structure. Beneath it is a space for den-building

and a hammock is to be installed. Children will also be able to climb and explore the different levels.

Residents include the great crested grebe and the UK's smallest bird, the goldcrest, which is currently breeding. The

reservoir is maintained by the East Reservoir Community Garden, as part of the London Wildlife Trust.

St Michael's Nursery in Clapton was praised for responding positively to last minute requests when other placements fall through.



NHS dental treatment charges explained

Your dentist should always tell you how much you need to pay before starting your treatment. These prices are correct to 31st March 2010. To check up to date prices visit the Department of Health website www.dh.gov.uk

Band 1 course of treatment £16.50

This covers an examination, diagnosis (e.g. x-rays), advice on how to prevent future problems and a scale and polish if needed. This is also the charge for urgent treatment when you need to see a dentist immediately.

Band 2 course of treatment £45.60

This covers everything listed in Band 1, plus any further treatment such as fillings, root canal work or if your dentist needs to take out one or more of your teeth.

Band 3 course of treatment £198.00

This covers everything listed in Bands 1 and 2, plus crowns, dentures or bridges.

Many people do not have to pay for dental treatment It is free if any of the following apply:

- you are aged under 18
- · you are aged 18 and in full-time education
- you are pregnant or a mother who has had a baby in the previous 12 months
- you are getting, or your partner is getting, Income Support, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance or Pension Credit Guarantee Credit
- you have, or your name is on, a valid NHS tax credit exemption certificate
- you have the right to full help under the NHS Low Income Scheme (ie you are named on a valid HC2 certificate)
- you are staying in an NHS hospital and your treatment is carried out by the hospital dentist
- you are an NHS Hospital Dental Service outpatient (however, you may have to pay for your dentures or bridges)

Raising prostate awareness

THE Prostate Cancer Charity wants to recruit African-Caribbean volunteers in Hackney to raise awareness of the condition in their community.

According to experts, black men are three times more likely to develop the illness than their white counterparts.

It is hoped that black men and women joining





The Air-Balloon: a poem addressed to youth

by John Wafford of Hackney who was inspired by the ascent

HIS month sees the centenary of the first powered flight by an Englishman in an all-British aeroplane.

Alliott Verdon Roe (1877-1958), who founded the famous Avro aircraft manufacturing firm, trained as a marine engineer but became fascinated with the idea of building a flying machine.

In 1907 he won a Daily Mail competition to design a model capable of sustained flight and with the prize money built his first full-sized plane. Two years later, in July 1909, Roe made his flight in Roe I, a tri-plane constructed from wood and paper, powered by a 9hp engine, managing to fly 30 metres over Walthamstow Marshes.

Roe's was not the first notable flight to take place in the skies above Hackney. One hundred years earlier an unmanned balloon made of varnished paper was sent up from Clapton by a Mr T Forster on 25 October 1809. It flew for five minutes before landing on Hackney Downs. A second balloon was launched the following morning, coming down in the late afternoon at Wilbraham near Cambridge.

A contemporary account of Forster's aerial experiments is held in the Local Studies Library at Hackney Archives.

Manned balloon ascents were a great attraction of the age, with several taking place in the grounds of Hackney taverns and pleasure gardens. James Sadler (1753-1828) was the first English 'aeronaut' and the second man to make a balloon ascent in England. On 12 and 29 August 1811, Sadler's balloon was launched from the Mermaid Tavern in Mare Street, on the first occasion flying to Tilbury Fort, on the second to East

The Times of 30 August reported that the balloon 'rose slowly from among the trees; and the majestic motion – the beauty and magnitude of the machine – the concourse – the

burst of rich sound from

the band – the shouts of the thousands and tens of thousands who overflowed the face of the country, gave as many images of grandeur and delight to the eye and the ear as perhaps it was possible to combine into the moment'. Sadler was accompanied on his first

flight by Captain Paget of the Royal British Navy, and on the second by Henry Benjamin Hanbury Beaufoy (1786-1851) who took readings with various instruments and performed experiments with bottles of champagne. Beaufoy later published a diary kept during the flight, a copy of which is in the Local Studies Library.

Sadler's flights are not officially commemorated in Hackney but that of AV Roe is marked by a GLC blue plaque, campaigned for in the early 1980s by children from Mandeville Primary School in Clapton, on one of the railway arches crossing the Marshes beneath which the tri-plane was built. Over the years it has been battered by the weather, but a replacement English Heritage plaque has now been commissioned. Lee Valley Park celebrated the centenary of Roe's flight on the afternoon of 12 July. A replica of the triplane owned by Roe's grandson – the original is at the Science Museum.



WATER House Head Chef Ben Spice is pairing the best in seasonal vegetables with his love of North African food again this month.

"In Britain we often tend not to think of soup in the summer, but if you look to food cultures in warmer climes there is often a great tradition of having soup and bread, even when the weather is scorching.

"It's not only a great way to take advantage of a multitude of summer vegetables in a simple and straightforward way but it's also a great way to get some hydration." Ben explains: "The base of any great summer soup is a fantastic stock. In the restaurant we use the tough outer layers of onion, carrots and celery along with the fibrous outer leaves of artichokes and courgette ends.

"In enough cold water to comfortably cover all the vegetables, bring a pot slowly to the boil. Once the pan is boiling you can add any soft herbs you have.

"Simmer for 45 minutes until you have a rich flavourful liquid then drain off your vegetables, allow the liquid to cool, and then reserve."



North African spicy tomato and spinach soup

Serves 4-6

25 mins

Cooking

Preparation time

1 hour for stock then 10 minutes finishing time

- 6 cloves garlic finely sliced (use a kitchen
- mandolin if available for really even slices)
- 2tbsp olive oil

Ingredients

- 3 large ripe tomatoes, diced
- 6 handfuls spinach
- 1.8litres fresh vegetable stock
- 2 pinches freshly ground coriander seeds
- 2 pinches freshly ground cumin seeds





Each vehicle visits a different estate in the borough every day of the week. They offer a place where people aged from eight to 19 years – or up to 25 if they are registered as having a disability – can meet friends and get advice on anything, from career prospects to relationships.

Young people have chosen the activities available. These include help with revision for

and use the internet; sports, health and beauty sessions; off-site trips such as to the theatre; and Easy Access point (CHECK). They also take part in performing arts activities.


